From The Executive Director

In our last newsletter, I referenced a Greek proverb that states, “*a civilization flourishes when people plant trees under which they will never sit.*” Since that issue, there have been a number of examples of how fortunate the Museum of American Heritage is to enjoy the friendship of people whose spirit of philanthropy reflects those very principles.

We recently received a very special gift from an extraordinary couple, Meri and Joe Ehrlich. This philanthropic couple generously planted a seed for MOAH’s long-term growth by making a gift of \$100,000. As per their wishes, \$90,000 will be invested in MOAH’s general endowment fund at the Silicon Valley Community Foundation. MOAH maintains two endowment accounts with the SVCF - the Ruth Bell Lane Memorial Garden fund to support MOAH’s gardens, and our general endowment fund. Funds invested in the endowments remain intact in perpetuity, and MOAH draws only 5% of the interest for annual operations. The Ehrlich Family, the Lane Family and the endowment funders are planting the seeds of knowledge that all of us can help tend for future generations.

Many of our members and supporters gave MOAH a wonderful holiday gift. I am pleased to report that our 2006 Annual Appeal raised nearly \$34,000 in support of MOAH’s education initiatives, making it the most successful campaign of its kind in our Museum’s history. To all of you who participated, thank you. Your contributions will ensure that our unique exhibits and programs continue to grow. While your donations will have such an important effect on our activities, your most valuable gift to us is the confidence that your support has inspired. Knowing that there is so much commitment from our community to continue is so motivating to all of us who are involved with MOAH’s exhibits, programs and classes.

Recently, a mother of one of our weekend students told me she was elated by the discovery of our “gem of an organization,” which she knew would have a transformational role in her son’s interests and life. She was awed by the ability and commitment of our instructors and Museum volunteers and asked me to express her gratitude to the MOAH family.

Current Exhibit - *100 Years At The Williams House: The Early Years*

February 9 – June 3, 2007

What was life like a century ago? You can get glimpses of it through the current Museum of American Heritage exhibit, *100 Years at the Williams House: The Early Years*, on view now through June 3.

Dr. Thomas Williams built the Ernest Coxhead-designed home for himself, his wife and two young daughters. They moved into it in 1907 – and their furniture was brought to the house by horse-drawn wagon.

Some of the elements of this exhibit that are delighting visitors include:



* Actual movie footage of the Williams family's 1926-7 around-the-world trip. They were among the first families to own a home movie camera, and took it with them on their travels. Brian George, Palo Alto Historical Association member, transferred the film onto DVD, and Wendy Fierro has made it available to us so that you can see this rare treasure. Many thanks to both of them for their generosity.



* Stereoptican slides that visitors can view for themselves. This early 3-D technology was one of the pastimes that families enjoyed before TV and even before radio. Schools also used them as a teaching tool.



* A beautiful ice box that was donated to the Museum by Patricia Schmidt just in time for this exhibit. Imagine keeping food cold courtesy of the ice man who would deliver a block of ice every few days!

* The examining room/surgery and laboratory of Dr. Williams, one of Palo Alto's early doctors. He maintained these in a wing of the house for several years before he built an office elsewhere. Here you can see some of the types of instruments he would have used.

Docents from PAST Heritage conduct architectural tours of the house every Saturday at 2:00 PM (*see article on facing page*). Be sure to take advantage of this opportunity for an in-depth look at this historic home.

A Matter of Form & Function

In conjunction with the centennial celebration of MOAH's home, the members of Palo Alto Stanford (PAST) Heritage have generously taken on the task of conducting weekly architectural tours of Williams House.



The building permit for the home was taken out by Dr. Williams in 1906, not too long after the great earthquake of that year. While not part of the original design, the garage appears in photographs taken in 1908. Designed by noted Bay Area architect Ernest Coxhead, the house was built in the Tudor Revival style, as reflected in the wide chimney and steep gables. Beautiful redwood panels and timbers and numerous pocket doors are evident throughout the structure. A strong Arts & Crafts influence reveals itself in the

many original features and fixtures that are still present in the home. Examples include "Madame MOAH," our nickname for the knocker gracing the front door, as well as the lovely outdoor light fixture that illuminates her.



A characteristic that sets the Williams House apart from many other homes of the same era is the degree of innovative



technology original to the structure, from the all-electric light fixtures to the skylight in the doctor's examination room.

Architectural tours cover both residential areas of the house and the doctor's office, and include a brief survey of the exterior and gardens. Tours begin each Saturday at 2:00 PM. As with all the Museum's exhibits, tours are free and open to the public.

MOAH 2007 Summer Camps

As we reported in our previous newsletter, this year MOAH will offer multiple summer sessions, two of which will follow the general curriculum guidelines from prior years. We design programs that encourage campers to be interested in science. The lecture-style presentations, together with the hand-on activities and projects, emphasize the importance of mathematics in all subjects in science.

This year, we have updated and extended the camp program to include new units on aerodynamics, mechanics and elements of product design. Below is a brief overview of this year's camp offering:

Session 1 (June 25 – 29)

- * Adventures in Electronics: Jim Wall joins regular instructors, Wes Anderson, Dor Hasselgrave, Bob Boschert and Hermann Ebenhoeh, to teach a day-long session on neat electronic projects.
- * LEGO® Robotics: Last year's campers had great fun learning how to program LEGO® Mindstorm robotic vehicles and to compete in races. Bob Katzive promises to enhance the program to make it even more exciting this summer.
- * Video Production: This unit has scored one of the higher ratings from our campers in the past three years.
- * Mechanics in Action: Michael Glenn will teach campers the principles of simple machines as they each build a trebuchet, a medieval siege engine.
- * Aerodynamics of Flying Rings: Campers will explore aerodynamic principles of flying objects under the guidance of Alan Adler, inventor of the Aerobie®.

- * Mathematical Explorations Through Puzzles: Did you know that many fields in mathematics owe their origins to puzzle solving?
- * Biology and Genetics: This unit on DNA will be led by scientists from the Stanford Human Genome Center.
- * Encore Presentations on Crime Scene Investigation: Students will explore evidence collection, as well as DNA applications in forensic science.

Session 2 (July 9 – 13)

- * Adventures in Electronics
- * LEGO® Robotics
- * All Charged Up! Dor Hasselgrave will design a brand new unit on the chemistry of batteries.
- * Mechanics in Action: This is an extended unit from camp session 1, complete with a trebuchet race in the park.
- * Designer's Laboratory: Jeff Risberg brings his "Design of Super Heroes" workshop to MOAH Camp!
- * Aerodynamics of Flying Rings

Keith Kvenvolden



In the 1930s and 40s, Cheyenne, Wyoming and Keith Kvenvolden were quite compatible. Both were small and young. “I come from a small town where we did small-

town things. For entertainment, my friends and I would run down to the depot and watch the largest steam locomotive, the Big Boy, pull into town.” Dr. Kvenvolden’s world has expanded a bit since then, but he still keeps Cheyenne close by in his Palo Alto backyard. He is constructing from scratch models of buildings he remembers, especially the train depot, complete with his Garden Railroad and Big Boy engine ready to make the long haul around his property.

His childhood interest in rocks and earth science eventually led him to NASA, where he was involved in the Apollo and Viking programs. There he studied lunar samples and meteorites with their amino acids intact, the building blocks of life as we know it. His next professional move was to the USGS, where his expertise in marine organic geochemistry led to the study of methane gas in marine sediments. His knowledge of how our planet does its best to provide all living creatures a place to thrive makes him concerned for the future of earth. “There are all these buffer systems trying to keep things in check, but it’s possible our species can override the system.” Global change issues are a big part of his life.

Keith’s contributions to MOAH are considerable. In addition to his duties as docent, he was a recent contributor to the Model Ship exhibit, where two of his handmade models were on display. His model trains and model ship building, his Renaissance recorder playing, his continued interest in preserving the health of our planet, and his MOAH activities are just a few things that keep a twinkle in his eye and his heart young. After the two-hour interview he asked, “When does the interview begin?” The energizer bunny has nothing on this man. Google Dr. Keith Kvenvolden to see what else he’s been up to. It can’t be squeezed into this article, no matter how small the font.

Next Exhibit - *Look How Things Have Changed!*

Williams House Centennial

June 15 – November 4, 2007

The second exhibit celebrating the Williams House centennial, opening June 15, highlights the decades of the '30s through the '50s. The new exhibit will focus on major changes in technology as people began to "live better electrically."

How did the Williams family's daily life change to reflect the rapid development in home entertainment, communication and business equipment, homemaking appliances and modes of travel? Imagine the world opening up as radio broadcasting evolved from a single local station in San Jose to national networks and short wave broadcasts from overseas. Labor-saving appliances eased tasks such as washing, ironing, sewing, cooking and cleaning. When ice cream could finally be stored at home, the Williams family bought a large commercial-type freezer, which is still in the basement. Friends often joined the family for sherbet or ice cream and music in the garden.

After viewing this exhibit, you'll be able to answer such questions as:

- * The Williamses shared pictures of their continuing world travels. What famous air service did they use?
- * How did Palo Alto begin to cope with the increasing need for electrical power? (Part of the solution turned out to be a "green" power source long before this phrase became common.)
- * How did Rhona Williams feel about the placement of a major high-voltage power line on their beloved family ranch property?
- * How does the family trust continue to support Stanford University School of Medicine?

Come learn the rest of the story of a century of discovery and change, and this remarkable family that lived it.
